Brite Divinity School (Fort Worth, Texas) invites applications, expressions of interest, and nominations for its next Academic Dean and Executive Vice President (ADEVP). Brite seeks a visionary leader and scholar as its ADEVP, who brings a deep understanding of graduate theological education in the 21st century, a passion for innovative pedagogy, and an unwavering commitment to Brite's vision of a world transformed by God's love, mercy, and justice. The ADEVP is responsible for advancing Brite's academic mission, overseeing a talented and distinguished faculty, and fostering an inclusive, engaging, and dynamic learning environment. The ADEVP will work collaboratively with faculty, students, administration, and the community to enhance academic programs, support scholarly research, and ensure the highest standards of graduate theological education.

ABOUT BRITE DIVINITY SCHOOL

Brite Divinity School is a premier progressive institution in graduate theological education. Located on the campus of Texas Christian University (TCU), Brite prepares leaders by focusing on excellent scholarship, pastoral training, and spiritual development through distinctive academic programs. The student body, faculty, and staff at Brite Divinity School are interracial, international, and ecumenical. While the largest numbers of students at Brite are Disciples of Christ and United Methodists, more than 20 different denominations are represented in the student body. Faculty and staff are active members in over ten different denominational/religious bodies. The ecumenical spirit is also strengthened by Brite's membership and participation in the Council of Southwestern Theological Schools embracing 11 Protestant and three Roman Catholic institutions.

Accredited by the Association of Theological Schools (ATS), with the next comprehensive accreditation visit set for spring of 2032, and by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC), Brite Divinity School is one of four seminaries related to the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the denomination's only seminary related to a university. Brite is also approved by the United Methodist Church to teach United Methodist students preparing for ordained ministry.

As of Spring 2025, Brite enrolls 155 students, taught and advised by 13 exceptional faculty, with an additional two faculty searches opening in the Fall. Brite cultivates a welcoming and inclusive environment that affirms diverse identities, theological perspectives, and cultural traditions, encouraging dialogue and partnership with religious communities across traditions, fostering mutual understanding and shared ministry. Brite remains a pillar for social justice advocacy, actively engaging in issues of racial equity, LGBTQ+ inclusion, economic justice, and environmental sustainability.

Commitment to Access

Brite Divinity School is committed to making theological education accessible and affordable for its students. As of the 2023-2024 academic year, Brite offers full tuition and fee scholarships to all master's students, in addition to offering merit-based scholarship awards. All admitted Ph.D. students receive full tuition assistance and an annual merit stipend. By offering these financial support options, Brite aims to reduce financial barriers and empower students to pursue their theological education with confidence.

Academics at Brite

Brite engages with the Church and community in navigating the changing religious and social landscape of the day, sharing scholarship and spiritual practices while gaining relevant input from clergy and laity. As students pursue their theological education, faculty walk alongside them in their journey of spiritual formation. Students at Brite can also engage with immersive field education and supervised ministry, growing professional skills and personal and vocational identities.

Brite Programs and Centers

Brite is home to specialized programs and centers that advance theological and ministerial development. Brite's centers, including the <u>Center for Lifelong Learning</u> and the <u>Center for Theology and Justice</u>, serve as hubs for research, education, spiritual development, and community engagement, addressing contemporary challenges in faith, ethics, and public life.

To this day, and for the past nine decades, Brite hosts the impactful Ministry Week conference, as part of the Center for Lifelong Learning; a dynamic festival of learning, worship, and inspiration, drawing hundreds of participants annually. The Stalcup School of Theology for the Laity, housed within the Center for Lifelong Learning, is open to all who want to continue learning and growing through biblical study, exploration of contemporary issues from a faith perspective, interfaith dialogue, and critical thinking about the basis of Christian understanding of God, humanity, and the world.



Brite offers formal and informal programs that connect with various denominational and faith traditions, including The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), Baptist Studies, Episcopal Studies, Metropolitan Community Churches, Presbyterian Studies, United Church of Christ, and United Methodist Studies. Brite also offers educational opportunities across its community programs, including:

- Asian/Asiana American and Pacific Islander Church Studies
- Black Church Studies Program
- Borderlands Institute (focused on border awareness issues)
- Carpenter Initiative on Gender, Sexuality, and Justice
- Jewish Studies Program
- Latina/o/x Church Studies Program
- Soul Repair Center (focused on moral injury and veteran care)

In addition, Brite Divinity School and TCU allow qualified students to pursue the Collaborative Degree Program, where students are admitted to both a Brite Divinity School master's program and either the TCU Neeley School of Business Masters of Business Administration Program or the TCU Harris College of Nursing and Health Sciences Master of Social Work Program.

Brite Faculty and Staff

Brite's distinguished scholars and practitioner faculty comprises nationally and internationally recognized theologians, biblical scholars, ethicists, and ministers. <u>Faculty at Brite</u> represent a broad spectrum of theological traditions, cultural backgrounds, and academic specializations. Brite's professors are deeply committed to teaching and mentorship, engaging in student mentoring, fostering intellectual growth, and nurturing future religious and community leaders.

Brite faculty are renowned and respected scholars, regularly contributing to theological discourse through books, peer-reviewed articles, and public scholarship. <u>Faculty-authored books</u> are published by leading academic presses and widely utilized in theological education and beyond. Through their research and writing, Brite's faculty advance critical conversations in theology and religious studies, shaping the future of ministry and faith-based activism.

Brite staff members are uniquely devoted to students' development and central to the transformational nature of a Brite education. Many staff are graduates of Brite and bring thoughtful perspectives to the work of their alma mater. Staff members are regarded as co-educators, and their contributions are deeply valued.

Leadership at Brite Divinity School

Rev. Dr. Stephen Cady serves as President of Brite Divinity School. Dr. Cady began his tenure on March 4, 2024, and was officially inaugurated on November 2, 2024. Prior to his role at Brite, Dr. Cady served as the Senior Minister of Asbury First United Methodist Church in Rochester, New York. During his tenure, the congregation was recognized for its social justice initiatives, anti-poverty efforts, and LGBTQ+ advocacy. Notably, under his leadership, the church completed a significant capital campaign to establish a Community Outreach Center offering essential services to vulnerable community members.

Dr. Cady holds a Ph.D. from Princeton Theological Seminary, a Master of Divinity from Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary, and a Bachelor of Arts from Ohio Wesleyan University.



Governance

Trustees are charged with oversight and support of the Divinity School and are drawn from the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and several other denominations. Qualifications include active membership in a church or synagogue.

Relationship with Texas Christian University (TCU)

Although Brite Divinity School and Texas Christian University are independent institutions, they have a rich historical relationship and enjoy a shared heritage, affiliation, traditions, and values with the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). TCU was founded in 1873 by two brothers, Addison and Randolph Clark, both ministers of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). In 1914 a generous gift from Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Brite, West Texas ranchers, funded Brite College of the Bible under a separate charter. When the charter was renewed in 1963, the name of the College was changed to Brite Divinity School. Since 1914, Brite has been a separate corporation with its own Board of Trustees, assets, and employees. Brite and TCU operate under a shared services agreement that articulates the University's contractual commitment to provide essential administrative support, operational and maintenance services, and the vision of both institutions to assure a continuing spirit of mutual involvement, cooperation, and support for the benefit of students, staff, and faculty.

Role of Academic Dean and Executive Vice President

The Academic Dean and Executive Vice President (ADEVP) is a Board-elected Operating Officer who reports to the President. The ADEVP oversees the six degree programs, administrators, and faculty who relate to those programs of instruction. The ADEVP has responsibility for accreditation of the programs of instruction. The ADEVP also oversees the directors of lay and continuing education programs. The ADEVP supports efforts at Brite to diversify further the representation of scholars, staff, and students whose racial and cultural heritage is not European American, and to assist Brite in its efforts to become an anti-racist and multicultural organization.

The ADEVP serves as the chief academic officer, providing strategic leadership for the development and administration of Brite Divinity School's academic programs. The ADEVP stewards the academic excellence and curricular assessment, faculty recruitment and development, and advancement of scholarly research and pedagogy. The ADEVP ensures the integrity of academic offerings, fosters a culture of inclusive excellence, and supports student formation and success. Additionally, the ADEVP collaborates with senior leadership on institutional planning, accreditation processes, and external partnerships to strengthen Brite's position as a leading theological institution committed to justice, diversity, and ministerial leadership.

The ADEVP will lead the Dean's office team, including the Assistant Dean for Academic Affairs and the Director of Technology Resources. The next ADEVP of Brite will join a community passionate about, and dedicated to, Brite's success and will have the opportunity to bring visionary leadership, build upon the legacy and trajectory of the school in the modern theological educational landscape, and be embedded in a campus, church community, and region that is supportive, empowering, and engaging.

Dr. Stephen Cady, who brings deep commitment, energy, and a hopeful spirit as President, the ADEVP will have the opportunity to embrace a collaborative leadership partnership. The new ADEVP will oversee faculty receiving the supportive infrastructure, technology, and training, to ensure modalities are successfully implemented, assessed for efficacy, and maintained.
- Champion Brite across theological education, the Church, the community, and the world: The next ADEVP of Brite must be able to communicate the uniqueness and value of Brite Divinity School as a destination for progressive theological education. The ADEVP will have the opportunity to contribute to the broad, purposeful, and impactful marketing of Brite, its academic offerings, the success of its faculty and staff, students, and alums, and its value and impact across theological institutions and seminaries. The ADEVP will help to ensure that Brite's public perception and profile will inspire and continue to attract community members of the highest caliber. With an excellent foundation on which to build, Brite is eager to, and deserves to, have its reputation better known nationally and internationally. Brite's next ADEVP will be a thought leader in theological education and will find ways to shine a light on Brite by



contributing to important conversations about the evolving nature of theological education, the impact of the Church, and God's role in humanity's quest for meaning.

Brite Divinity School seeks an Academic Dean and Executive Vice President who will embrace its distinctive mission, be a passionate leader in theological education, embody a teacher-scholar spirit, demonstrate the depth and breadth of knowledge needed to successfully shape a contemporary seminary/divinity school, and consult with and contribute to Brite's community with conviction and enthusiasm. The candidate of choice will be a compassionate leader with a highly relational approach, bringing outstanding communication skills, humility, authenticity, self-confidence, integrity of the highest order, a strong work ethic, and a clear understanding of graduate theological education and the Church.

The ideal candidate for the role of ADEVP will be a seasoned administrator who brings a proven track record for community-building, strategic leadership, and a collaborative approach to serving theological education. The new ADEVP will be a leader with a distinguished academic record who commands the respect of the scholarly community and merits appointment as a tenured professor at Brite Divinity School. Given Brite's long-abiding connection to The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), membership in The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) denomination is preferred but not required.

- A dedicated advocate for teaching excellence, professional development, and scholarly activity;
- An inclusive, balanced, accessible, and committed supporter of the principles of shared governance, transparency, and inclusive decision-making;

- And an energetic, optimistic, and resilient leader with good humor and a desire to provide respected, long-term leadership.
